



TEN EASY, NO COST WAYS TO BE A GOOD NEIGHBOR

Having good neighbors starts with being a good neighbor. Sometimes, a small change of habit can mean being a better neighbor. None of these suggestions costs anything. All of them can help make VP a friendlier place.

- **1. Bulky Trash**: Don't put trash out on the curb before the monthly pickup date. Doing so contributes to a trashy looking neighborhood, and could result in a fine from the City.
- **2. Pooper Scooper:** Don't let your dog dump in your neighbor's yard. Carry a pooper scooper when you walk the dog. It's the law.
- **3. Turn it Down!:** Keep the volume down after 10:00 PM.
- **4. Don't Park in the Yard**: City code prohibits parking on an unpaved surface.
- **5. Rake Your Leaves**: Bag them up for bulky trash pickup, or start a compost pile in the backyard. Don't leave them all winter to blow in your neighbor's yard or rot in the gutter.
- **6. Don't Park in Front of Your Neighbor's House**: No, it's not illegal to park in front of the house next door, but it's rude to adopt that spot as your personal parking

spot. Your neighbor would like to park there himself, or have that spot for his visitors.



- **8. Barking Dogs:** Train your dog to not bark too much. Everyone appreciates a good watchdog. No one appreciates a dog that barks all the time.
- **9. Drive Friendly**: We're all in a hurry, but take it easy in your neighborhood. Let the other person go first when parked cars clog the street. Slow down!
- **10. Smile and Wave:** Smile when you meet someone walking down the street. Wave when you see your neighbor walking his dog, even if you don't know his name. Smile and give a wave of thanks when another driver lets you go first just they way they do in small towns in Texas.

JULY YARD OF THE MONTH

The yard of the month for July goes to 5527 Vickery, home of Matt and Jennifer Bryarly and their huge English Bulldog, Shackleford. Matt and Jennifer have lived in their 1926 craftsman-style bungalow for almost 4 years and through a lot of trial and error (as Matt put it) came up with a winning combination for the shady front yard.

The path to the front porch is off center due to the huge pecan tree that provides the house with welcoming shade in the summer. As you approach the porch, you'll see a sweet little garden on the left that contains hostas, rosemary and caladiums with lovely begonias in the flowerbox. A pretty birdbath is also in this area.

On the right side of the path is a larger, longer bed the spans the length of the

porch. Here you'll find more of the hostas and begonias but also upright junipers, Mexican heather, azaleas. hydrangeas that have huge pink blooms and elephant ears. It's a calming, quiet and shady garden that you should see if you need ideas for your shady spot.

Plant: Color for fall such as asters, marigolds, zinnias, warm season grasses, tomatoes, peppers and other warm season veggies for fall harvest.

Fertilize: If you didn't fertilize in June with an organic fertilizer, it's time to do it now

Prune: Roses to encourage fall blooming, dead or damage limbs in trees or other plants, and dead-head plants to remove the spent blooms to encourage new flowers.

Water: Water infrequently but deeply – and don't forget the water restrictions the city may have. Don't let your automatic sprinkler run during the day if the restrictions are on.

Pest Control: Take advantage of the organic nurseries in our area to find chemical-free pest control for all types of pest on all types of plants.

Don't forget! Feed and water the birds, they are nature's insect control! Empty standing water around your property to keep down the mosquito population.
